The Village of Ewing has applied for funding for the above-referenced project through the Drinking Water State Revolving Fund (DWSRF) program jointly administered by the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) and NDEE. Although this project is ranked as a low priority, it was included on the Funding List in the DWSRF State Fiscal Year 2020 Intended Use Plan due to the joint commitment to fund the project with the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program. Ewing is located in northeastern Nebraska, on State Highway 275, southeast of the intersection with Highway 20. The community has a population of 375 according to the 2018 census estimate, relatively stable over the past decade.

The public water system (PWS) consists of three municipal wells, a 50,000 gallon water tower built in the early 1900's and a distribution system with undersized cast iron and transite pipe. In December 2017, a Preliminary Engineering Report was prepared to study the needs of the public water system with system operating pressures highlighted as a concern. The existing supply wells are old, with construction dating back to 1953 through 1973; however, recent inspection records noted no major concerns and each of the wells are still capable of meeting projected peak day demand for the system. Thus the report concluded that the old water

tower should be replaced with the same storage capacity, but at a greater height to increase pressures in the distribution system. Further, areas of dead end water mains will be looped to also address the existing pressure concerns, as well as the replacement of the remaining section of transite (i.e., asbestos-cement) water pipe.

The Village is eligible for a 30-year loan at an interest rate of 1.5 percent. In addition to principal and interest payments, an administrative fee of 0.5 percent of the loan balance will be assessed each year. The revenues from Ewing's water utility will be dedicated to repay the loan. The projected annual DWSRF Debt Service (including 10% coverage) is \$23,881. Ewing's current water rate for a typical residential connection is \$15 per month with a consumption charge of \$1.30 for every 1,000 gallons used, or just over \$24 per month based on an average 7,000 gallon household use. After accounting for the \$385,000 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) and \$159,512 in DWSRF forgiveness assistance (i.e., 25% of the remaining project costs), based on 244 active service connections, monthly household rates may need to be raised \$8.38 to address the new debt service, to approximately \$32.50 per month.

In order to obtain funding clearance for the CDBG award, the proposed project was reviewed by numerous Federal and State agencies for environmental impacts per the attached environmental assessment. The vast majority of responses were positive in that they indicated the project would have no affect/effect, indicated there was no concerns, or noted the project was cleared to move forward. The only concern raised was the lack of available federal floodplain mapping for the area, however the Nebraska Department of Natural Resources stated it did not identify any regulated floodplains, and all distribution mains will be placed below the ground surface, and the new water tower will be sited in a location that from a review of available information has never flooded.

A Public Hearing was held August 12, 2019, with 47 days advanced posted notice. The Engineer gave a description and status of the proposed project. No comments were made by the Village residents in attendance and no other input was received from the public.

The Village has a permit to operate a public water system under the provisions of the Nebraska Safe Drinking Water Act and the Regulations Governing Public Water Supply Systems, Title 179. The proposed project is determined by DHHS to help the public water system maintain compliance with the Safe Drinking Water Act. The system last underwent a routine sanitary survey by DHHS on November 1, 2018, wherein no deficiencies were noted. That completed survey is the first step of the Technical, Financial, and Managerial (TFM) program policy. The Village will still be required to undergo an Initial, and if necessary, a Final TFM Assessment by the DHHS, to ensure that their capabilities meet the requirements of the Safe Drinking Water Act. Also, their current Environmental Tracking Tool score is 0, well below the allowable 11 per issued U.S. Environmental Protection Agency guidance.

The infrastructure investment in a Replacement Tower and Water Mains is in line with the stated goals of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's Drinking Water Infrastructure Sustainability Policy. Removing the last section of transite water pipe will provide a public health

benefit. No significant environmental impacts have been identified that would result from the proposed action. A National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System Construction Stormwater permit will be required by NDEE if more than one acre of land is disturbed. The tower will be installed on land owned by the Village. Consequently, a preliminary decision has been made that an Environmental Impact Statement will not be prepared.

This action is taken on the basis of a careful review of the environmental assessment, the preliminary engineering report, and other supporting data that are on file with NDEE. The latter are available for public review upon request and the environmental assessment is attached. The NDEE will not take any administrative action on the project for at least 30 calendar days from the date shown below. Purpose of the Project: ["Statement of Purpose and Need for the Proposal" -40 CFR 1508.9(b)]
The purpose of the proposed project is to improve the Village of Ewing's water system. The Village of Ewing has a water pressure issue, which prevents homeowners and businesses from having a reliable water source. In an emergency situation, the safety of residents could get put at risk without proper water pressure. Low pressure also increases the risk of backflow contamination, which would cause contaminants to enter Ewing's drinking water system.

Description of the Project: Include all contemplated actions that are logically either geographically or functionally a composite part of the project, regardless of the source of funding. [24 CFR 58.32, 40 CFR 1508.25] As appropriate, attach maps, site plans, renderings, photographs, budgets, and other descriptive information.

The environmental review area includes parts of Section 34, Township 27 North, Range 9 West and parts of Sections 2 and 3, Township 26 North, Range 9 West, Holt County, Nebraska. The latitude/longitude coordinates for the approximate center of Ewing are 42°15'36"/-98°20'38". The proposed project will include constructing a new water storage facility located at [Walnut and Nebraska Street], looping the water mains at [North Street and Ash Street; East Jackson Street; Jackson and Main; Nebraska and Cedar and South Walnut], and well improvements which are located at [Well 58-1, 66-1, 73-1]. CDBG funds will assist in funding the water storage facility at \$350,000, as well as \$25,000 in General Administration and \$10,000 in Construction Management. The Village will fund the remaining project with Drinking Water State Revolving Funds (DWSRF) in an estimated amount of \$525,000 loan and \$114,646 in loan forgiveness. Total project costs are estimated to be \$1,024,646. The Village of Ewing has a low-to-moderate-income population of 53.70% according to a recent 2018 Income Survey. See ATTACHMENT 1.

Existing Conditions and Trends: Describe the existing conditions of the project area and its surroundings, and the trends likely to continue in the absence of the project. [24 CFR 58.40(a)]

A flow test performed indicated that the static pressure in the Ewing distribution system ranged from 27-33 PSI. On four of the six tests, the PSI dipped below 20. Based on current design standards, the normal working pressure in the distribution system should be 60-80 PSI and not less than 35 PSI. As a result of Ewing's low water pressure, typical households are not able to simultaneously do laundry and shower, or run the dishwater and water the lawn. Some households have difficulty running appliances. In the event of no action of the proposed project, the low water pressure problem will continue.

This is not an acceptable alternative due to the lack of pressure in the distribution system, dead-end mains, and the age of the elevated storage tower, which is at the end of its useful life.





Introduction

The Nebraska Game and Parks Commission (Commission) and the U.S.. Fish and Wildlife Service (Service) have special concerns for endangered and threatened species, migratory birds, and other fish and wildlife and their habitats. Habitats frequently used by fish and wildlife species are wetlands, streams, riparian (stream side) woodlands, and grasslands. Special attention is given to proposed developments that include modification of wetlands, stream alteration, loss of riparian habitat, or contamination of habitats. When this occurs, the Commission and Service recommends ways to avoid, minimize, or compensate for adverse effects to fish and wildlife and their habitats.

The Commission has responsibility for protecting state-listed endangered and threatened species under authority of the Nongame and Endangered Species Conservation Act (NESCA) (Neb. Rev. Stat. § 37-801 to 37-811). Pursuant to § 37-807 (3) of NESCA, all state agencies shall, in consultation with the Commission, insure projects they authorize (i.e., issue a permit for), fund or carry out do not jeopardize the continued existence of state-listed endangered or threatened species or result in the destruction or modification of habitat of such species which is determined by the Commission to be critical. If a proposed project may affect state-listed species or designated critical habitat, further consultation with the Commission is required.

The Service has responsibility for conservation and management of fish and wildlife resources for the benefit of the American public under the following authorities: 1) Endangered Species Act of 1973 (ESA); 2) Fish and Wildlife Coordination Act; 3) Bald and Golden Eagle Protection Act; and 4) Migratory Bird Treaty Act. The National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) requires compliance with all of these statutes and regulations.

Pursuant to section 7(a)(2) of ESA, every federal agency, shall in consultation with the Service, ensure that an action they authorize, fund, or carry out is not likely to jeopardize the continued existence of a listed species or result in the destruction or adverse modification of designated critical habitat. If a proposed project may affect federally listed species or designated critical habitat, section 7 consultation is required with the Service. It is the responsibility of the federal action agency to fully evaluate all potential effects (direct and indirect) that may occur to a listed species and critical habitat in the action area. The federal agency provides their effects determination to the Service for concurrence. If federally listed species and/or designated/proposed critical habitat would be adversely affected by implementation of the project, the federal agency will need to formally request further section 7 consultation with the Service prior to making any irretrievable or irreversible commitment of federal funds (section 7(d) of ESA), or issuing any federal permits or licenses.

Informal consultation pursuant to NESCA and ESA can be completed by using the Conservation and Environmental Review Tool (CERT). The CERT analyzes the project type and location, and provides a series of habitat questions and conservation conditions in this report, if applicable. Project proponents can agree to implement conservation conditions as outlined in the report and applicable to the project type by signing in the designated areas and uploading the signed PDF as part of their "final" project submittal. The Commission and the Service concur that by agreeing to and implementing the conservation conditions as outlined, then such projects are not likely to adversely affect listed species and further consultation is not required. If the report indicates the project "May Affect" listed species, then further consultation with the Commission and/or the Service is required.

Additional Considerations

Baid and Golden Eagle Protection Act

The federal Bald and Golden Eagle Protection Act (Eagle Act) (16 U.S.C. 668-668c) provides for the protection of the bald eagle (*Haliaeetus leucocephalus*) and golden eagle (*Aquila chrysaetos*). Under the Eagle Act, "take" of eagles, their parts, nests or eggs is prohibited without a permit issued by the Secretary of the Interior. Disturbance resulting in injury to an eagle or a decrease in productivity or nest abandonment by substantially interfering with normal breeding, feeding, or sheltering behavior is a form of "take."

Bald eagles use mature, forested riparian areas near rivers, streams, lakes, and wetlands and occur along all the major river systems in Nebraska. The bald eagle southward migration begins as early as October and the wintering period extends from December-March. The golden eagle is found in arid open country with grassland for foraging in western Nebraska and usually near buttes or canyons which serve as nesting sites. Golden eagles are often a permanent resident in the Pine Ridge area of Nebraska. Additionally, many bald and golden eagles nest in Nebraska from mid-February through mid-July. Disturbances within 0.5-miles of an active nest or within line-of-sight of the nest could cause adult eagles to discontinue nest building or to abandon eggs. Both bald and golden eagles frequent river systems in Nebraska during the winter where open water and forested corridors provide feeding, perching, and roosting habitats, respectively. The frequency and duration of eagle use of these habitats in the winter depends upon ice and weather conditions. Human disturbances and loss of wintering habitat can cause undue stress leading to cessation of feeding and failure to meet winter thermoregulatory requirements. These affects can reduce the carrying capacity of preferred wintering habitat and reproductive success for the species.

To comply with the Eagle Act, it is recommended that the project proponent determine if the proposed project would impact bald or golden eagles or their habitats. This can be done by conducting a habitat assessment, surveying nesting habitat for active and inactive nests, and surveying potential winter roosting habitat to determine if it is being used by eagles. The area to be surveyed is dependent on the type of project; however for most projects we recommend surveying the project area and a ½ mile buffer around the project area. If it is determined that either species could be affected by the proposed project, the Commission recommends that the project proponent notify the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission as well as the Nebraska Field Office, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service for recommendations to avoid "take" of bald and golden eagles.

Migratory Bird Treaty Act

Under the Migratory Bird Treaty Act (16 U.S.C. 703-712: Ch. 128 as amended) (MBTA) construction activities in grassland, wetland, stream, woodland, and river bank habitats that would otherwise result in the taking of migratory birds, eggs, young, and/or active nests should be avoided. Although the provisions of MBTA are applicable year-round, most migratory bird nesting activity in Nebraska occurs during the period of April 1 to July 15. However, some migratory birds are known to nest outside of the aforementioned primary nesting season period. For example, raptors can be expected to nest in woodland habitats during February 1 through July 15, whereas sedge wrens, which occur in some wetland habitats, normally nest from July 15 to September 10. If development in this area is planned to occur during the primary nesting season or at any other time which may result in the "take" of nesting migratory birds, we would request that the project proponent arrange to have a qualified biologist conduct a field survey of the affected habitats to determine the absence or presence of nesting migratory birds. If a field survey identifies the existence of one or more active bird nests that cannot be avoided by the planned construction activities, the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission and the Nebraska Field Office, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service should be contacted immediately. For more information about the MBTA and avoiding impacts to migratory birds, or to report active bird nests that cannot

be avoided by planned construction activities, please contact Eliza Hines, Nebraska Field Office, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, 9325 South Alda Road, Wood River, NE 68883. Adherence to these guidelines will help avoid the unnecessary take of migratory birds.

Fish and Wildlife Coordination Act

The Fish and Wildlife Coordination Act (FWCA) requires consultation with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (Service) and the State fish and wildlife agency (i.e., Nebraska Game and Parks Commission) for the purpose of preventing loss of and damage to fish and wildlife resources in the planning, implementation, and operation of federal and federaly funded, permitted, or licensed water resource development projects. This statute requires that federal agencies take into consideration the effect that the water related project would have on fish and wildlife resources, to take action to prevent loss or damage to these resources, and to provide for the development and improvement of these resources. The comments in this letter are provided as technical assistance only and are not the document required of the Secretary of the Interior pursuant to Section 2(b) of FWCA on any required federal environmental review or permit. This technical assistance is valid only for the described conditions and will have to be revised if significant environmental changes or changes in the proposed project take place. In order to determine whether the effects to fish and wildlife resources from the proposed project are being considered under FWCA, the lead federal agency must notify the Service in writing of how the comments and recommendations in this technical assistance letter are being considered into the proposed project.

Section 404 of the Clean Water Act

In general, the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service have concerns for impacts to wetlands, streams and riparian habitats. We recommend that impacts to wetlands, streams, and associated riparian corridors be avoided and minimized, and that any unavoidable impacts to these habitats be mitigated. If any fill materials will be placed into waterways or wetlands, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Regulatory Office in Omaha should be contacted to determine if a 404 permit is needed.




Village of Ewing Water Improvements Project Aerial Image Basemap With Locator Map



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

As requested, the Nebraska Department of Natural Resources has reviewed the proposed project in Ewing for any impacts on surface water appropriations, registered groundwater wells, and floodplain management. Our comments are attached.

I would like to point out that there is no regulated floodplain along the Elkhorn River because Holt County has not been mapped yet for the National Flood Insurance Program. The county is currently in the process of being mapped along the Elkhorn watershed and depending on the outcome of the mapping process and the timetable of Ewing's Water System Improvement project, a floodplain development permit may be required in the future. Until then, the risk of flooding should be kept in mind when building, constructing, or excavating in lower areas and along the creek.



REQUEST FOR RELEASE OF FUNDS

On or after May 14, 2019, the Village of Ewing will submit a request to the Nebraska Department of Economic Development (DED) for the release of Community Development Block Grant funds under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended to undertake the following project:

Project Title: Ewing Water System Improvements

Purpose: Water system improvements will be made in the Village of Ewing, Holt County, Nebraska, that include constructing a new water storage facility located at Walnut and Nebraska Street, looping the water mains at North Street and Ash Street; East Jackson Street; Jackson and Main; Nebraska and Cedar and South Walnut, and well improvements which are located at Well 58-1, 66-1, 73-1.

Project Cost: CDBG funds will assist in funding the water storage facility at \$350,000, as well as \$25,000 in General Administration and \$10,000 in Construction Management. The Village will fund the remaining project with Drinking Water State Revolving Funds (DWSRF) in an estimated amount of \$525,000 loan and \$114,646 in loan forgiveness. Total project costs are estimated to be \$1,024,646.

Location: All activity will take place within the Village of Ewing, Holt County, Nebraska.

FINDING OF NO SIGNIFICANT IMPACT

The Village of Ewing has determined that the project will have no significant impact on the human environment. Therefore, an Environmental Impact Statement under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (NEPA) is not required. 
